



Volunteer Service in Thailand

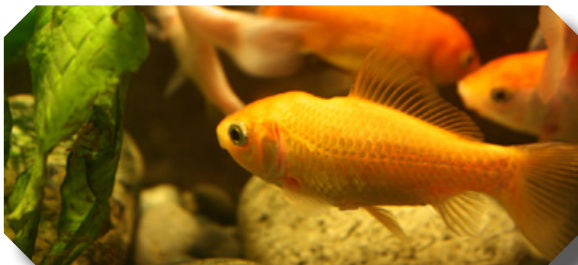
Our family spent November 2011 in Thailand with extended family. Towards the end of our holiday, Tipkamon and I volunteered some of our time at a stray-dog rescue centre in Bang Po (south of Bangkok) that had been set up by NGO's, including '[World Vets](#)' and '[Elephant Nature Foundation](#)', to provide medical and surgical attention to animals affected by the severe months-long flooding. Tipkamon, who is an RN specialized in Neonatal Intensive Care, worked as my vet tech as we treated dogs and puppies afflicted with bacterial and fungal skin infections, wounds, and severe diarrhea caused by parasites and parvovirus.

Health Care in the Aging Horse

Guiding principles for the care and maintenance of the aging horse will be briefly introduced here. A more detailed article is available on the '[Equine and Pet Topics](#)' page of my website.

Feed high quality diets; separate feeding from younger/aggressive horses; ensure free access to clean fresh water; consider feeding extruded feeds, especially through the winter.

Provide appropriate shelter, and use a breathable waterproof blanket when it is cold and wet outside.

Inform your veterinarian of changes in body condition, behaviour and attitude.

Maintain an appropriate deworming and vaccination schedule.

Speak to your veterinarian about arthritis, Equine Cushings Disease, cataracts, cancers and other age related problems.
